Pastor's Ponderings

"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?
Why are you so far from helping me, from the
words of my groaning?
O my God, I cry by day, but you do not answer;
and by night, but find no rest." Psalm 22:1-2

A familiar psalm from our Lord's mouth in the Garden before his arrest, torture, and death. A psalm that comes to my mind as I see suffering. This past week we had the capsizing of a duck boat in Branson, Missouri. In the past months children being separated from parents at our border. During my lifetime terrible gun violence from a Las Vegas hotel, to a school in Parkland, Florida, and a church in Charleston, South Carolina. Terrible earthquakes, windstorms, and floods. My God, my God!

I feel these words spoken by our Lord in my being when thinking about getting up the courage to fight fear. The fear that is pervasive in the world that leads us to close our doors, our wallets, our eyes, ears, and mouths to suffering. I am tired of the fear of the "other." I am tired of justifying unkindness and human degradation as protecting ourselves and what is ours. However, belief in this God that we feel forsaken from, our great and glorious God, leads me to realizing that our God is the creator and "owner" of all that exists. In a sense what is ours isn't ours, it's God's!

How would God want for us to use what we think is ours?
To open doors, open hearts, open wallets, open minds, and



open our future to a new a different reality that does not lead with My God, my God! Instead it leads with... "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." ... "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Matthew 22:37) Love the Lord, love the neighbor as we love ourselves. The church needs to be a voice of love, courage, hope,

kindness, and peace in a world of division, fear, selfishness and doubt.

I am still trying to find the courage, My God, my God! Christ is Risen, Alleluia!

Love Your Neighbor as Yourself

It's one of the best-known passages in the Bible, of course. Most of us have known it all our lives, but we don't take it out and think about it really carefully very often. When I was a kid, on Garfield Street in Lancaster, neighbor meant the people who lived next door, or across the street, or down the block. A neighborhood was a definite area, and neighbors were the kids we played with, who lived in the houses we trick-or-treated on Hallowe'en. I don't remember asking myself whether I loved them. I'm pretty sure I loved my own family a lot more, anyway. I don't remember thinking about loving myself. That would have seemed to be a strange thing to think about.

Well, here I am, almost 82 years old, taking a good look at myself and at other folks and trying to come to terms with what this great old Biblical statement really means. Let's start with the idea of loving yourself. I guess this is the way I see it. If you're doing the things you believe are right to do; if you're not going around feeling better than everybody else; if you're accomplishing some good things when you have the chance; you have a right to "love" yourself, funny as it may sound.

The problems many people have with this wonderful old saying have to do with a much more extended meaning of "neighbor" than the one I had as a kid. If you think of all God's children as your neighbors—and I think that's what the Bible wants us to do—the comfortable feeling of a neighborhood kinda disappears. People look different, speak different languages—notice how words like "different" complicate the situation.

I've been watching the Olympic games on TV this summer, and I find it heartwarming to see people from one country hugging those from another, often even after losing to them in a race or game; to see athletes of different colors and nationalities admiring the abilities and strengths of people they're in competition with. Oh, sure, national pride is actively present, too, but it's wonderful to see admiration, good nature, compliments being passed among so many of the athletes. People from countries that have fought bitter wars in past years are out there speaking favorably about each other's talents, strengths, abilities.



Love your neighbor as yourself. It's not always easy, but often you can find clear reasons for feeling close to someone rather than emphasizing things from the distant past or ideas someone else gave you about a person or a whole country. Wouldn't it be great if we could concentrate on seeing the strong and beautiful things about our worldwide neighbors!
